The Modern Man Seminar

In the not too distant future, other people — at work, among your friends, in your family — will be depending on you for guidance. Your ability to lead them well will depend to a large extent on whether you live a reflective life yourself, allowing you to grasp why certain things are true, not just blindly accepting what everyone else says. In the world today, masculinity and manliness are under attack, such that boys are pushed to choose between one of two extremes: brainless chauvinism or feeble submissiveness. This seminar gives you a framework to tackle fundamental intellectual questions about who man is and his role in the modern world.



Freshman Mentoring

Each participant is assigned a mentor at the beginning of their freshman year. During freshman year, the mentor meets individually with him once a month. Mentors help participants to apply the principles covered in each seminar to their everyday lives through practical and measurable monthly goals. Mentors focus on guiding participants to greater self-knowledge and challenging them to form the habits that will define their character. Mentoring sessions last about 30 minutes and take place at Sauganash Study Center. Mentoring is not formally offered after freshman year. Participants may arrange with their mentor to continue to meet on a basis that both the mentor and mentee agree upon.
